

Strengthen HRSA Program Management and Operations.

- **22.9 million patients, including 1 in 3 people living at or below the poverty level**, rely on a HRSA-supported health center for primary medical care.
- **One in 2 people diagnosed with HIV** receives care through the Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program.
- **9.7 million people living in health professional shortage areas** receive primary medical, dental or mental health care from a National Health Service Corps clinician.
- **Approximately half of pregnant women and a third of infants and children** benefit from the Title V Maternal and Child Health Block Grant.
- **More than 800,000 rural Americans** receive health services thanks to rural community-based grants.
- **About 145,500 parents and children** participate in the Federal Home Visiting Program, which serves states and jurisdictions.
- **About 6,000 life-saving unrelated blood stem cell transplants** facilitated annually.
- **Almost half of individuals participating in workforce training and loan programs** received at least a portion of their training in a medically underserved community.
- **Ryan White HIV/AIDS clients' viral suppression rates** improved nine percent in three years – from 70% to 79% from 2010 to 2013.

# FY 2017 Budget Request: \$10.7 Billion

## Ryan White HIV/AIDS

**\$2.3 billion** to support cities, states, and local community-based organizations to help those patients living with HIV have access to health services.

## Maternal & Child Health


**\$1.3 billion** to improve the health of all mothers, children and their families.

## Rural Health Policy

**\$144 million** to promote better health care service in rural America.

## Healthcare Systems

**\$128 million** to provide oversight to organ and tissue donation and transplantation systems, poison control, vaccine injury compensation, and drug discount programs.



## Primary Health Care

**\$5.1 billion** for comprehensive primary and preventive health care services in medically underserved communities.

## Health Workforce

**\$1.3 billion** to educate, train, and connect health care professionals to communities in need.

## Family Planning

**\$300 million** to expand family planning services to individuals in need by improving access to family planning centers and preventive services.

## Program Management

**\$157 million** to support HRSA's program oversight and operations.

## Budget Highlights

The Budget provides **\$10.7 billion** for HRSA to promote improvements in access, quality, and equity that are essential for a healthy nation. The Budget includes:

- **\$5.1 billion** for the Health Center Program to support quality improvement and performance management activities at more than 1,300 health centers operating over 9,000 primary care sites;
- **\$1.3 billion** for HRSA workforce programs to improve access to high-quality health care professionals for underserved and vulnerable populations;
- **\$100 million** over two years for new initiatives to increase treatment for prescription drug abuse and heroin use, and to increase access to mental health services through the National Health Service Corps;
- **\$9 million** through the Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program to support Hepatitis C Treatment for People Living with HIV;
- **\$144 million** for support of rural hospitals and other rural health providers in their provision of accessible and quality health care for Americans living in rural communities;
- **\$10 million** for an expanded Rural Opioid Overdose Reversal program that focuses on prevention, treatment, and intervention of opioid use in rural communities;
- A new cost recovery fee and new rulemaking authority to strengthen the 340B program;
- Extensions of mandatory funding for the Health Center Program, National Health Service Corps, Home Visiting Program, and the Teaching Health Center GME Program.
