**NURSE CORPS LOAN REPAYMENT
AND SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMS
FISCAL YEAR 2015**

Executive Summary

The NURSE Corps Loan Repayment and Scholarship Programs Report to Congress for Fiscal Year 2015 is in response to section 846(h) of the Public Health Service Act, which states, in part:

Not later than 18 months after August 1, 2002, and annually thereafter, the Secretary shall prepare and submit to the Congress a report describing the programs carried out under this section.

The overarching goal of many Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) programs is to support and facilitate the provision of health care in areas of greatest need. HRSA administers the NURSE Corps Loan Repayment Program (LRP) and Scholarship Program (SP) to help ensure a sufficient distribution of nursing graduates and professionals. The NURSE Corps LRP and SP support nursing education and training by providing recruitment and retention incentives to nurses committed to a career in underserved communities. These incentives take the form of either a loan repayment or a scholarship award in exchange for service in a health care facility with a critical shortage of nurses (“Critical Shortage Facility” or “CSF”) that is located in a Health Professional Shortage Area (HPSA).¹ The NURSE Corps LRP is also authorized to extend loan repayments to nurse faculty serving in accredited schools of nursing.

The NURSE Corps SP received over 2,300 applications and the LRP received over 6,900 applications. A total of 1,178 new and continuation NURSE Corps awards (909 LRP and 269 SP) were made to residents of 50 states, Puerto Rico and the District of Columbia in FY 2015. Of the 717 new and continuing awards to NURSE Corps LRP participants serving at CSFs, 97 percent served at CSFs in high-need HPSAs, which are defined as areas with a score of 14 or higher. The average HPSA score for the FY 2015 CSF placements was 17. In addition, 192 NURSE Corps LRP awards were to nurse faculty participants, with 78 percent of new nurse faculty awardees serving at schools with at least a 50 percent enrollment of students from disadvantaged backgrounds. Furthermore, 71 percent of NURSE Corps SP awards were given to baccalaureate students and 19 percent to students obtaining their Master’s degree with 9 percent awarded to individuals pursuing associate’s degrees and 1 percent awarded to nursing diploma students.

With the addition of the participants who received awards in FY 2015, the NURSE Corps field strength includes over 2,000 registered nurses and nurse faculty members fulfilling multi-year service commitments as of September 30, 2015. In addition, 83 percent of the NURSE Corps alumni remained at the site where they fulfilled their obligation for at least 1 year beyond the completion of their NURSE Corps commitment.

I. Legislative Language

This report is being provided to Congress as required in Section 846(h) of the Public Health Service (PHS) Act [42 U.S.C. 297n(h)], as amended, which states, in part:

Not later than 18 months after August 1, 2002, and annually thereafter, the Secretary shall prepare and submit to the Congress a report describing the programs carried out under this section.

II. Introduction

In 2002, the Nurse Reinvestment Act amended section 846 of the PHS Act, adding the Nursing Scholarship Program to complement the established Nursing Education Loan Repayment Program. Section 103 of the Nurse Reinvestment Act was referred to as the “National Nurse Service Corps” in the legislation. Reflecting the statute section title and goals of the program, NURSE Corps was chosen as the umbrella term referring to both loan repayment and scholarship programs. The Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) administers the NURSE Corps Loan Repayment Program (LRP) and Scholarship Program (SP) to help ensure a sufficient distribution of nursing graduates and professionals.

The NURSE Corps LRP, first authorized in 1971, is a financial incentive program under which individual registered nurses (RNs), and advanced practice RNs (APRNs) such as nurse practitioners (NPs), enter into contractual agreements with the federal government to work full time in a health care facility with a critical shortage of nurses, which is also known as a Critical Shortage Facility (CSF), in return for repayment of qualifying nursing educational loans. The NURSE Corps LRP repays 60 percent of the outstanding principal and interest on the nursing education loans of RN and APRN participants with the greatest financial need in exchange for 2 years of full-time service at a health care facility with a critical shortage of nurses. Participants may be eligible to receive repayment of an additional 25 percent of the original qualifying loan balance in exchange for a third, optional year of full-time service.

When the program was reauthorized by P.L. 111-148 in 2010, the NURSE Corps LRP was extended to nurse faculty who agree to serve at an accredited school of nursing. Fiscal year (FY) 2010 was the first year that the NURSE Corps LRP made awards to nurse faculty. These awards assist in the recruitment and retention of nurse faculty at accredited schools of nursing by decreasing economic barriers that may be associated with pursuing a career in academic nursing. Nurse faculty participants receive the same loan repayment benefits as program participants who serve at a health care facility with a critical shortage of nurses.

The NURSE Corps SP pays tuition, fees, and other reasonable costs and provides a monthly stipend to individuals attending accredited schools of nursing in exchange for a service commitment of at least 2 years in health care facilities with a critical shortage of nurses after graduation. Tuition and fees are paid directly to the accredited school of nursing based on an invoice submitted by the scholar’s school official. Other reasonable costs reflect an additional annual payment provided directly to each scholar to assist with the cost, as submitted by the academic institution, of books, clinical supplies/instruments, and uniforms. Stipend amounts are

the same for each scholar; the amount for each full-time student in 2015 was \$1,316 per month. Part-time scholars received a proportionately reduced stipend payment. The NURSE Corps SP awards reduce the financial barrier to nursing education for all levels of professional nursing students, thus increasing the pipeline of nurses who will serve in underserved areas. A funding preference is given to qualified applicants who have the greatest financial need, as determined by the applicants' expected family contribution.

Together, NURSE Corps LRP and SP impact the distribution of nurses across the U.S. through placement in facilities with critical shortages of nurses. Many factors will continue to affect the demand and supply of the nurse workforce, including population growth, aging of the population, overall economic conditions, aging of the nursing workforce, demand for health services broadly and within specific health care settings, and health care reimbursement. A smaller growth in RN supply relative to state-specific demand is projected in 16 states, resulting in a shortage of RNs in these states by 2025; 10 of these states are in the West, 4 are in the South, and 2 are in the Northeast region.² Employers in some parts of the country report difficulty in recruiting and retaining an adequate number of RNs primarily because of an aging RN workforce and a lack of younger RNs to fill positions. States in the South and Midwest regions of the United States have younger nursing workforces as compared to the Northeast and West regions of the country.³ The differences in the age structure of the nursing workforce suggest that actions for workforce development, as well as projections for supply and distribution of RNs, differ by geographic region.

At the same time, almost one-third of pre-licensure RN programs were unable to expand capacity due to lack of faculty.⁴ To become nurse faculty, RNs must continue their training and assume additional financial and time commitments that many working nurses cannot afford. The average age of doctoral- and master's degree-prepared nurse faculty is 56.8 years and 55 years, respectively.⁵ As nurse faculty retire, the shortage of nurse faculty will become more pronounced.

The NURSE Corps LRP and SP work together to address the need for nurses in CSFs, and the NURSE Corps LRP also supports nurse faculty at accredited schools of nursing. Since FY 2003, the NURSE Corps LRP and SP have identified various types of CSFs that have been deemed to have a critical shortage of nurses. In FY 2012, the CSF definition was further refined to include certain types of health care facilities that are located in, designated as, or serving a Health Professional Shortage Area (HPSA) with shortages of Primary Medical Care or Mental Health professionals. HPSAs are designated by the HRSA as having shortages of primary medical,

dental, or mental health providers and they may be geographic areas, population groups, or medical facilities. Since FY 2012, the NURSE Corps programs have incorporated a funding preference based on the facility's primary medical care or mental health HPSA score in order to maximize placement in shortage facilities and ensure that participants are serving underserved communities. This change allowed the program to allocate resources to facilities of greatest need and to improve participant placements.

III. Overview

NURSE Corps program priorities are reviewed and established annually in the application guidance for each program. In FY 2015, 50 percent of the NURSE Corps LRP and SP funding was set aside to support NPs who serve in underserved areas. To increase the number of NPs participating in the programs, the NURSE Corps LRP and SP actively recruited licensed NPs and individuals interested in pursuing training as a NP through outreach efforts to colleges, universities, and associations.

During the NURSE Corps application review process, a funding preference was given to applicants with the greatest financial need, defined as those qualified applicants whose debt to salary ratio is 20 percent or greater. Among qualified NURSE Corps LRP applicants with the greatest financial need, top priority was given to RNs who work in CSFs with a HPSA score of 14 or above and nurse faculty who work at eligible schools of nursing with at least 50 percent enrollment of students from disadvantaged backgrounds. Among NURSE Corps SP applicants with the greatest financial need, top priority was given to nursing students enrolled full-time in a graduate level NP program.

This report, which is required under section 846(h) of the PHS Act, summarizes the activities of the NURSE Corps LRP and SP for FY 2015. The report provides information on:

- The number of enrollees, scholarships, loan repayments, and grant recipients;
- The number of graduates;
- The amount of scholarship payments and loan repayments made;
- The educational institution the recipients attended;
- The number and placement location of the scholarship and loan repayment recipients at health care facilities with a critical shortage of nurses;
- The default rate and actions required;
- The amount of outstanding default funds of both the scholarship and loan repayment programs;
- The reason for the default to the extent that it can be determined;
- The demographics of the individuals participating in the scholarship and loan repayment programs;
- The justification for the allocation of funds between the scholarship and loan repayment programs; and
- An evaluation of the overall costs and benefits of the programs.

IV. Report Requirements

Requirement #1: The Number of Enrollees, Scholarships, Loan Repayments, and Grant Recipients

In addition to awards made with annual appropriations, new and continuation NURSE Corps LRP and SP awards were also made with funds recovered from those who breached their contracts. Section 846(g)(4) of the PHS Act authorizes amounts recovered from participants who breach their NURSE Corps LRP and SP contracts to be available to serve the purposes of the program and to remain available until expended. These funds are referred to in this report as X-year funds. A discussion of default rates follows on pages 11-12. The program uses the recovered funds to make new awards, continuations, and modifications to the existing contracts. In FY 2015, the NURSE Corps LRP added \$362,403.13 to its X-year account from participants who breached their contracts and NURSE Corps SP added \$ 226,058.94. No awards were made in FY 2015 with X-year funds for both NURSE Corps LRP and SP. NURSE Corps LRP and SP applications received and awards made are shown in Tables 1 and 2.

NURSE Corps LRP: The participant receiving the award enters into an initial contract for 2 years of service, in return for an award equal to 60 percent of the participant’s qualifying nursing education debt. The initial contract may be continued, at the participant’s request, to add a third year of service, in return for an award equal to an additional 25 percent of the original qualifying debt amount. Participants requesting continuations must be in good standing with the terms of the initial contract to be considered for additional funding. All eligible continuations are funded before new awards are made.

A total of 590 new NURSE Corps LRP awards were made from annual appropriations (see Table 1). Of the new awards, 155 (26 percent) were made to RNs, 301 (51 percent) were made to NPs, 11 (2 percent) were made to certified registered nurse anesthetists (CRNA), 7 (1 percent) were made to certified nurse midwives, 2 (0.3 percent) were made to clinical nurse specialists, and 114 (19 percent) were made to nurse faculty. A total of 319 NURSE Corps LRP continuation awards were made from annual appropriations. Of these, 84 continuation awards (26 percent) were made to RNs, 143 (45 percent) were made to NPs, 11 (3 percent) were made to CRNAs, 2 (1 percent) were made to certified nurse midwives, 1 (0.3 percent) was made to a clinical nurse specialist, and 78 (24 percent) were made to nurse faculty. A total of 909 NURSE Corps LRP awards were made.

NURSE Corps SP: The NURSE Corps SP offers scholarships to individuals attending accredited schools of nursing in exchange for a service commitment upon graduation of at least 2 years in health care facilities with a critical shortage of nurses. The NURSE Corps SP awards reduce the financial barrier to nursing education for all levels of professional nursing students, thus increasing the pipeline of nurses who will serve in underserved areas. A funding preference is given to qualified applicants with the greatest financial need, based on the applicants' expected family contribution. If a scholar agrees to a contract for less than the full duration of the training program (e.g., a scholarship covering only the first 2 years of a 4-year baccalaureate degree program), the scholar may request a continuation of the contract in return for a commitment for additional years of support. All eligible continuations are funded first before new awards are made.

Of the 257 NURSE Corps SP new awards from annual appropriations (see Table 2), 24 (9 percent) were awarded to associate's degree students, 183 (71 percent) were awarded to bachelor's degree students, 48 (19 percent) were awarded to master's degree students, and 2 (1 percent) were awarded to nursing diploma students. A total of 12 continuation awards were made with annual appropriations, with 3 (25 percent) being awarded to bachelor's degree students and 9 (75 percent) being awarded to master's degree students.

Requirement #2: The Number of Graduates

NURSE Corps SP participants may attend accredited associate degree, baccalaureate degree, or diploma programs. Scholars may opt for between 1 and 4 years of scholarship support, which consists of payment of tuition and fees, other reasonable costs, and a monthly stipend. The minimum service requirement is 2 years of full-time service, with a maximum of 4 years of full-time service, in a CSF depending on the number of academic years for which the scholar receives support. NURSE Corps SP participants may fulfill their service obligation part time by extending the years of service so that the aggregate amount of service performed will be the full-time equivalent. In FY 2015, there were 239 NURSE Corps SP graduates from accredited school programs. Of these, 98 are serving in a CSF as of September 30, 2015 (Appendix A). There are three NURSE Corps SP graduates in nursing residency programs as of September 30, 2015.

The remaining 138 graduates are actively seeking employment. NURSE Corps SP graduates have up to 6 months from their date of graduation to obtain a nursing license and accept an offer of employment from a NURSE Corps SP-approved CSF. Following acceptance, NURSE Corps SP graduates have up to 3 months to commence clinical services at the facility.

Requirement #3: The Amount of Scholarship Payments and Loan Repayments Made

The initial NURSE Corps LRP 2-year award pays an amount equal to 60 percent of the participant’s qualifying educational loan balance; the optional third year continuation pays an additional 25 percent of the original qualifying loan balance. NURSE Corps LRP continuations are funded before new awards are made.

The NURSE Corps SP scholarship pays tuition and fees, other reasonable costs, and a monthly stipend. The scholar may choose between 1 year and a maximum of 4 years of financial support. If a scholar agrees to a contract for less than the full duration of the training program (e.g., a scholarship covering only the first 2 years of a 4-year baccalaureate degree program), the scholar may request a continuation of the contract in return for a commitment for additional years of support. NURSE Corps SP continuations are funded before new awards are made.

Table 3 shows the total amounts paid for NURSE Corps LRP and SP new awards and continuations, funded from annual appropriations (base funds) and X-year funds.

Requirement #4: The Educational Institutions Attended by Recipients⁶

In FY 2015, NURSE Corps SP participants attended a total of 165 schools in 41 states, and Puerto Rico. Appendix B shows the distribution of NURSE Corps SP participants by state and educational institution.

Requirement #5: The Number and Placement Location of the Scholarship and Loan Repayment Recipients at CSFs with a Critical Shortage of Nurses

NURSE Corps LRP and SP participants who serve at a CSF must agree to a minimum 2-year service commitment. Pursuant to law, private, for-profit entities were no longer eligible for placement of NURSE Corps LRP participants after FY 2007. However, the statute permits NURSE Corps SP participants to serve at private, for-profit entities.

In FY 2012, the definition of a CSF was revised to improve program performance and to allocate program resources to facilities of greatest need. The revised CSF definition requires facilities to be located in, designated as, or serving a Primary Medical Care or Mental Health HPSA. The following types of facilities are considered to be eligible CSFs for placement of NURSE Corps LRP and SP participants:

- Critical Access Hospital;
- Disproportionate Share Hospital;
- Public Hospital;
- Federally Qualified Health Center;
- Indian Health Service Health Center;
- Native Hawaiian Health Center;
- Rural Health Clinic;
- Skilled Nursing Facility;
- State or Local Public Health or Human Services Department;
- Ambulatory Surgical Center;
- Home Health Agency;
- Hospice Program;
- Non-Disproportionate Share Hospital; and
- Nursing Home.

In FY 2015, 717 NURSE Corps LRP participants served in a total of 494 CSFs in 47 states and the District of Columbia (Appendix C). There were 192 NURSE Corps LRP participants who served as nurse faculty in a total of 145 schools of nursing in 39 states and the District of Columbia (Appendix D).

Requirement #6: The Default Rate and Actions Required

The NURSE Corps LRP and SP default rates are defined as the percentage of participants in a cohort who default, where a cohort is defined as all participants with a new or continuation contract awarded in a particular FY. Default rates are calculated as the number of participants who have defaulted divided by the total number of individuals in the cohort. Individuals usually participate for multiple years, but should they default at any time during their obligation, that default is counted in the rate for the FY in which they received their initial award. Therefore, for any given cohort, the default rate can change over time, as additional individuals may default. Until the full cohort has completed the program requirements or defaulted, there may be

increases in default rates from year to year, therefore, the default rates below may be subject to change.

The maximum number of years that a participant in full-time service may be in the NURSE Corps SP is 8 years, which reflects a maximum of 4 years while in school and a maximum of 4 years of obligated service. The maximum number of years that a participant may be in the NURSE Corps LRP is 3 years, which reflects 2 years of service under an initial contract and 1 additional year of service under a continuation contract. However, participants with periods of approved suspension of service during their obligation period may require an additional 1 to 2 years of monitoring. Therefore, the default rates are reported over a time span of 10 years for the NURSE Corps SP (see Table 4) and 5 years for the NURSE Corps LRP (see Table 5) to provide a more accurate picture of default rates.

Participants who breach their contracts are placed in default and are liable to repay the NURSE Corps LRP or SP funds they received, plus interest at the maximum legal prevailing rate, from the date of the participant’s breach of the contract. The interest rate for NURSE Corps debts is the applicable quarterly interest rate that is determined and fixed by the Secretary of the Treasury, after taking into consideration private consumer rates of interest. The NURSE Corps LRP and SP work with the participants placed in default by assisting them to satisfy their debts through service whenever possible.

Historically, few to no defaults occur within the first year of the service obligation. A total of 11 participants who were previously in default were granted an opportunity to return to service in FY 2015. Five participants were from the NURSE Corps LRP and six participants were from the NURSE Corps SP.

Requirement #7: The Amount of Outstanding Default Funds of Both the Loan Repayment and Scholarship Programs

Section 846(g)(4) of the PHS Act authorizes amounts recovered from participants who breach their NURSE Corps LRP or SP contract to be available for the purposes of the respective program and to remain available until expended. These funds are referred to in this report as X-year funds. The programs use the recovered funds to make new awards, continuations, and modifications to the existing contracts.

In FY 2015, the NURSE Corps LRP added \$362,403.13 to its X-year account from participants who breached their contracts. No awards were made from its X-year account. At the end of FY 2015, the NURSE Corps LRP's net accumulation amount was \$472,626.83 in its X-year account.

In FY 2015, the NURSE Corps SP added \$226,058.94 to its X-year account from participants who breached their contracts. At the end of FY 2015, the NURSE Corps SP's net accumulation amount was \$359,936.35 in its X-year account.

As of September 30, 2015, the total outstanding amounts of default debt to be collected were \$2,740,414 for the NURSE Corps LRP and \$8,147,087 for the NURSE Corps SP.

Requirement #8: The Reason for the Default

The most common reasons for default in the NURSE Corps SP are failure to verify employment, academic dismissal, and withdrawal from the school (see Table 6).

Requirement #9: The Demographics of the Individuals Participating in the Loan Repayment and Scholarship Programs

NURSE Corps LRP and SP participant demographic data are self-reported. Hispanic/Latino and Non-Hispanic/Non-Latino self-reported ethnicity data in the electronic application is requested separately from gender and race data. Applicants may choose to report on any of these demographic areas in whole or in part, which may contribute to higher reporting in certain categories than others. As a result, Hispanic/Latino and Non-Hispanic/Non-Latino data may be reported by a larger number of applicants as this information is the only metric for capturing ethnicity.

Of the NURSE Corps LRP and SP participants who chose to report on sex, race, and ethnicity, the majority were female and White, with Black or African-American participants as the largest minority group (see Table 8).

Requirement #10: Justification for the Allocation of Funds between the Loan Repayment and Scholarship Programs

Historically, total NURSE Corps funds have been allocated at 67-75 percent for the LRP and 25-33 percent for the SP. For FY 2015, \$81.8 million was made available for the NURSE Corps LRP and SP. Of the \$81.8 million, HRSA allocated \$70.8 million for the NURSE Corps LRP and SP, with the remaining \$11 million being used to directly support the NURSE Corps Programs in the form of staffing and acquisition contracts, including the electronic system used to process program applications and monitor awarded participants. Of the \$70.8 million, HRSA allocated 67 percent (\$47.2 million) to the LRP and 33 percent (\$23.6 million) to the SP. The combination of these programs allows flexibility in meeting the future needs through the NURSE Corps SP pipeline of nurses and the immediate needs through the NURSE Corps LRP, which places nurses in the field immediately.

Requirement #11: An Evaluation of the Overall Costs and Benefits of the Programs

Cost

1. FY 2015 NURSE Corps LRP Awards

A total of 590 new awards were made in FY 2015 which is a decrease of 12 percent as compared to the 667 new awards in FY 2014.

The average new award amount for non-faculty NURSE Corps LRP participants was \$70,743, with an average new award amount of \$52,813 for nurse faculty. This represents an 18 percent increase in the average new award amount for non-faculty participants and a 12 percent increase in the average new award amount for nurse faculty participants from FY 2014 to 2015.

2. FY 2015 NURSE Corps SP Awards

A total of 257 new awards were made in FY 2015. The average new award was \$90,539.01. This represents a 6 percent increase in the number of new awards and a 2 percent decrease in the average new award amount from FY 2014 to FY 2015.

3. Average Amount Funded per Year of Service Obligated

NURSE Corps LRP new awards are based on 2 years of obligated service and capped at 60 percent of the applicant's total eligible loan amounts. The average new NURSE Corps LRP award amount per year of obligated service was \$35,371 for nurses serving in CSFs and \$26,406 for nurses serving in accredited schools of nursing, which represents an 18 percent increase and a 12 percent increase, respectively, from FY 2014 to FY 2015.

The average cost of a NURSE Corps SP award is typically greater than the average cost of a NURSE Corps LRP award because NURSE Corps SP new award amounts may

include up to 4 years of tuition, fees, stipend, and other reasonable educational costs. All of these can vary by the school that a student attends and the program. The average new NURSE Corps SP award amount per year of obligated service was \$41,695.18, which represents a 4 percent decrease from FY 2014 to FY 2015.

Benefits

1. NURSE Corps LRP Continuations

NURSE Corps LRP continuations are a vehicle that the NURSE Corps LRP uses to reduce federal investments per year of direct support, as compared to a year of support for a new award, while still getting a year of service commitment at a CSF. In FY 2015, 49 percent of the participants initially awarded in FY 2013 came back for a continuation award. The NURSE Corps LRP awarded 319 continuations in FY 2015. Of the continuation awards, approximately 24 percent were made to nurse faculty (78 awards).

a. Low Default Rates

While individual year default rates are subject to fluctuations as program data are reconciled and each cohort moves closer to expected service completion, the default rates of the programs as of September 30, 2015, remain low. This demonstrates that the NURSE Corps LRP and SP are recruiting nurses suited for, and with a clear commitment to, service in areas with a critical shortage of nurses. The low default rate assures the program that its efforts strengthen the nursing workforce by increasing the number of practicing health care providers in underserved areas.

NURSE Corps SP: Of the 2,688 awards made from FY 2006 – FY 2015, 198 participants (7 percent) have defaulted as of September 30, 2015. A significant number of these participants failed to verify employment or withdrew or were dismissed from school.

NURSE Corps LRP: Of the 5,930 awards made from FY 2011 – FY 2015, 122 participants (2 percent) have defaulted as of September 30, 2015. A majority of these participants failed to complete the service obligation following their resignation from an approved site.

2. Placement

The overarching goal of the NURSE Corps programs is to ensure that recruited participants are serving where the need is greatest. The NURSE Corps LRP and SP work together in an effort to address the need for nurses in CSFs and support nurse faculty at schools of nursing. In FY 2003, the NURSE Corps LRP and SP identified various types of health care facilities that were deemed to have a critical shortage of nurses. In FY 2012, the definition of a CSF was revised to allocate program resources to facilities of greatest need and to improve program performance. CSFs are currently defined as health

care facilities located in, designated as, or serving a Primary Medical Care or Mental Health HPSA. Continued implementation of this redefined methodology for identifying CSFs resulted in 97 percent of new and continuing awards being made to NURSE Corps LRP RNs serving at CSFs in high-need HPSAs with a score of 14 or higher. The average HPSA score for the FY 2015 CSF placements was 17.

To increase the number of NPs participating in the programs, the NURSE Corps LRP and SP actively recruited licensed NPs and individuals interested in pursuing training as a NP through outreach efforts to colleges, universities, and associations. In FY 2015, 50 percent of the NURSE Corps LRP and SP funding was targeted to support NPs who will serve in underserved areas. As a result, the programs made 501 awards to licensed NPs or individuals pursuing training as a NP.

Through the FY 2015 new and continuation awards, 586 CSFs are benefitting from the NURSE Corps LRP participants' and SP graduates' service, and 145 different schools of nursing have NURSE Corps LRP nurse faculty members. The NURSE Corps total field strength includes the FY 2015 new and continuation award participants as well as those participants in ongoing service. As of September 30, 2015, 1,316 NURSE Corps LRP participants and 396 NURSE Corps SP graduates were in service in CSFs in 49 states, the District of Columbia, and the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico. There were also 318 NURSE Corps LRP nurse faculty participants at accredited professional schools of nursing in 41 states, the District of Columbia, and Puerto Rico.

In addition, 83 percent of NURSE Corps alumni remained at the site where they fulfilled their obligation for at least 1 year beyond completion of their NURSE Corps commitment. Of those who are no longer providing care at the site where they fulfilled their obligation, 40 percent are providing patient care at a different CSF or accredited school of nursing.

Conclusion

The NURSE Corps LRP and SP continue to work towards eliminating areas with a critical shortage of nurses across the United States. Through the efforts and accomplishments highlighted in this report, dedicated RNs and APRNs are able to care for underserved people in hospitals and clinics, and committed nurse faculty are supported in their mission to provide quality education in schools of nursing with students from disadvantaged backgrounds.
