**NURSE CORPS LOAN REPAYMENT
AND SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMS
FISCAL YEAR 2018**

Executive Summary

The NURSE Corps Loan Repayment and Scholarship Programs Report to Congress for Fiscal Year (FY) 2018 is in response to section 846(h) of the Public Health Service Act, which states, in part:

Not later than 18 months after August 1, 2002, and annually thereafter, the Secretary shall prepare and submit to the Congress a report describing the programs carried out under this section.

The goal of many Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) programs is to support the delivery of health care in areas of greatest need. HRSA administers the NURSE Corps Loan Repayment Program (LRP) and Scholarship Program (SP) to help ensure an improved distribution of nursing graduates and professionals. The NURSE Corps LRP and SP support nursing education and training by providing recruitment and retention incentives to nurses committed to a career in underserved communities. These incentives include either a loan repayment or a scholarship award in exchange for service in a health care facility with a critical shortage of nurses (Critical Shortage Facility or CSF) that is located in a Health Professional Shortage Area (HPSA).¹ The NURSE Corps LRP also extends loan repayments to nurse faculty serving in accredited schools of nursing.

In FY 2018, the NURSE Corps received \$87.1 million from annual appropriations. The NURSE Corps LRP received 7,833 completed new and continuation applications and the SP received over 2,455 new and continuation applications. HRSA made a total of 1,042 new and continuation NURSE Corps awards (823 LRP and 219 SP) to residents of 49 states and the District of Columbia. Of the 823 NURSE Corps LRP awards, 700 new and continuing awards were made to participants serving at CSFs—94 percent at CSFs in high-need HPSAs (high-need HPSAs are defined as areas with a score of 14 or higher, and the average HPSA score for the FY 2018 CSF placements was approximately 17). HRSA made 123 NURSE Corps LRP awards to nurse faculty participants—29 percent serving at schools of nursing with at least a 50 percent enrollment of students from disadvantaged backgrounds. Nearly 65 percent of SP awards were awarded to bachelor's degree students, 33 percent to master's degree students, 2 percent to associate's degree students, and less than 1 percent to nursing diploma students.

As of September 30, 2018, the NURSE Corps field strength included 1,865 registered nurses (RNs) and nurse faculty members fulfilling multi-year service commitments. Further, 90 percent of NURSE Corps alumni remained at a CSF for up to 2 years beyond the completion of their NURSE Corps service commitment.

I. Statutory Language

Section 846(h) of the Public Health Service Act (PHSA) requires that the Secretary provide a report to Congress. The PHSA states, in part:

Not later than 18 months after August 1, 2002, and annually thereafter, the Secretary shall prepare and submit to the Congress a report describing the programs carried out under this section.

II. Introduction

In 2002, the Nurse Reinvestment Act amended section 846 of the PHSA, adding the Nursing Scholarship Program to complement the established Nursing Education Loan Repayment Program. Section 103 of the Nurse Reinvestment Act, which referred to this set of programs as the “National Nurse Service Corps.” Consequently, reflecting the statute section title and goals of the program, NURSE Corps was chosen as the umbrella term referring to both programs. The Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) administers the NURSE Corps Loan Repayment Program (LRP) and Scholarship Program (SP). The purpose of these programs is to improve the distribution of nursing professionals.

- The NURSE Corps LRP is a financial incentive program in which Registered Nurses (RN) and advanced practice registered nurses (APRN), such as nurse practitioners (NP), enter into contracts with the federal government to work full-time in a facility with a with a critical shortage of nurses (CSF).² The LRP repays 60 percent of the outstanding principal and interest on the nursing education loans for participants in exchange for a 2-year service commitment. Participants may be eligible for an additional 25 percent repayment in exchange for an optional third year of full-time service. Participants selected are those with the greatest financial need.
- The NURSE Corps LRP also makes awards to nurses to serve as faculty at accredited schools of nursing where the students are from disadvantaged backgrounds. The awards aid in the recruitment and retention of nurse faculty by decreasing economic barriers associated with pursuing a career in academia. Nurse faculty receive the same loan repayment benefits as program participants serving at a CSF. In 2014, the National League of Nursing reported that the lack of faculty was a significant factor in RN programs being unable to expand capacity.³ To become nurse faculty an RN must continue training and assume additional financial and time commitments that many

working nurses cannot afford.⁴ The average ages of doctoral- and master's degree-prepared nurse faculty are 56.8 years and 55 years, respectively.⁵ The shortage of nurse faculty will become more pronounced as nurse faculty retire.⁶

- The NURSE Corps SP pays tuition, fees, and other reasonable costs and pays a monthly stipend to individuals attending accredited schools of nursing in exchange for a service commitment of at least 2 years in a CSF. The NURSE Corps SP reduces financial barriers to nursing education for all levels of professional nursing students, expanding the pipeline of nurses who serve in CSFs. Qualified applicants who have the greatest financial need⁷ receive a funding preference. Tuition and fees are paid directly to the schools while stipends are paid monthly to the students to assist with the cost of books, clinical supplies/ instruments, and uniforms. Stipends were \$1,363 per month in 2018. Each compliant participant received \$16,356 in yearly stipend support. Part-time scholars received a proportionately reduced stipend. NURSE Corps SP awards reduce financial barriers to nursing education for all levels of professional nursing students, thus increasing the pipeline of nurses who will serve in CSFs. Qualified applicants, who have the greatest financial need as determined by the applicants' expected family contribution (EFC), receive a funding preference.

The NURSE Corps LRP and SP work together to address the need for and support the distribution of nurses across the United States through the placement of nurses in CSFs. Many factors affect the supply and demand of the nurse workforce including population growth, aging of the population and the nursing workforce, overall economic conditions, demand for health services broadly and within specific health care settings, and health care reimbursement.⁸ A 2017 study projected less growth in the RN supply relative to demand in seven states that could result in regional shortages by 2030. Two of these states are in the West, three are in the South, one in the Midwest, and one in the Northeast.⁹ Employers in some parts of the country report difficulty in recruiting and retaining an adequate number of RNs because of an aging RN workforce and a lack of younger RNs to fill the positions.¹⁰ Southern and Midwestern states have younger nursing workforces than the Northeastern and Western states.¹¹ The differences in the age structure of the nursing workforce suggest that action to facilitate workforce development and projections for supply and demand of RNs differ by geographic region.¹²

III. Overview

HRSA establishes and publishes NURSE Corps program priorities annually in the application and program guidance for each program. In fiscal year (FY) 2018, 50 percent of the NURSE Corps LRP and SP funding was set aside to support NPs. To increase the number of NPs participating in the programs, the NURSE Corps LRP and SP actively recruited licensed NPs and individuals interested in pursuing training as an NP through outreach efforts to colleges, universities, and associations to increase the number of NPs serving in underserved communities.

For the NURSE Corps LRP, funding preference was given to applicants with the greatest financial need,¹³ and who are working in Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSA) with scores of 14 or above. For the NURSE Corps Faculty LRP, a funding preference is given to applicants teaching at schools where at least 50 percent of the student body are from a disadvantaged background.

For the NURSE Corps SP, funding preference was given to applicants with the greatest financial need based on the applicant's EFC. For FY 2018, this preference included an EFC between \$0 and \$5,328. Among qualified applicants with the greatest financial need, awards were made based on consideration of:

- Enrollment or acceptance in an accredited diploma or undergraduate nursing program or an accredited graduate-level NP program, including Psychiatric-Mental Health specialization and full-time or part-time registration for consecutive terms.
- Enrollment or acceptance in an accredited Doctor of Nursing Practice program, a program for certified nurse midwives, certified registered nurse anesthetists (CRNA), clinical nurse specialists, or psychology specialist, and full-time registration for consecutive terms.

This report summarizes the activities of the NURSE Corps LRP and SP for FY 2018, and provides information on:

- Number of enrollees, scholarships, loan repayments, and grant recipients;
- Number of graduates;
- Amount of scholarship and loan repayments made;
- Educational institution attended;
- Number and placement location of NURSE Corps LRP and SP recipients at CSFs;
- Default rate and actions required;
- Default fund amount outstanding for both the NURSE Corps LRP and SP;
- Reason for default to the extent that it can be determined;
- Demographics of the individuals taking part in the NURSE Corps LRP and SP;
- Justification for the allocation of funds between NURSE Corps LRP and SP; and
- Evaluation of the costs and benefits of the programs.

IV. Report Requirements

Requirement #1: The Number of Enrollees, Scholarships, Loan Repayments, and Grant Recipients

In addition to awards made with annual appropriations, NURSE Corps made new and continuation NURSE Corps LRP and SP awards with funds recovered from awardees who breached their contracts. Section 846(g)(4) of the PHSA authorizes X-year funds, the amounts recovered from participants who breach their contracts, to be available and remain available until expended. (Default rates are discussed on page 12.) The programs use the recovered funds to make new awards, continuations, and modifications to existing contracts. If a NURSE Corps SP scholar agrees to a contract for less than the full duration of the training program (e.g., a scholarship covering only the first 2 years of a 4-year bachelor degree program), the scholar may request a continuation of the contract in return for a commitment for additional years of support. Participants requesting continuations must be in good standing with the terms of the initial contract. The programs fund eligible continuations before new awards are made. In FY 2018, the NURSE Corps LRP added \$526,814.90 to its X-year account and NURSE Corps SP added \$623,301.94. These X-year funds provided 21 awards for NURSE Corps LRP and SP consisting of 10 new SP awards and 11 LRP awards. NURSE Corps SP also made five modifications to base awards (Tables 1 and 2).

HRSA made 823 NURSE Corps LRP awards, including 533 new awards from annual appropriations and 11 new X-year funds awards (Table 1). Of the total 544 awards, 202 (37.13 percent) were to RNs, 256 (47.06 percent) to NPs, 25 (4.60 percent) to CRNAs, 8 (1.47 percent) to certified nurse midwives, 1 (0.18 percent) to a clinical nurse specialist, and 52 (9.56 percent) to nurse faculty. HRSA also awarded 279 NURSE Corps LRP continuation awards from annual appropriations. Of these continuation awards, 97 (34.77 percent) were to RNs, 104 (37.28 percent) to NPs, 4 (1.43 percent) to CRNAs, 1 (0.36 percent) was to a certified nurse midwife, 2 (0.72 percent) to clinical nurse specialists, and 71 (25.45 percent) to nurse faculty.¹⁴

HRSA made a total of 219 NURSE Corps SP awards, including 200 new NURSE Corps SP awards from annual appropriations. In addition, HRSA made 10 new NURSE Corps SP awards and 5 modifications to base awards with X-year funds (Table 2). Of those 215 awards, 4 (1.86 percent) were awarded to associate's degree students, 139 (64.65 percent) to bachelor's degree

students, 71 (33.02 percent) to master’s degree students, and 1 (0.47 percent) to a nursing diploma student. HRSA made 4 NURSE Corps SP continuation awards with annual appropriations, with none awarded to associate’s degree students, 3 (75 percent) awarded to bachelor’s degree students, and 1 (25 percent) awarded to a master’s degree student.

Requirement #2: The Number of Graduates

NURSE Corps SP participants may enroll in accredited associate, bachelor, or master’s degree programs or diploma programs. Scholars may choose 1 to 4 years of scholarship support, consisting of payment of tuition and fees, other reasonable costs, and a monthly stipend. The minimum service requirement is 2 years of full-time service, with a maximum of 4 years of full-time service in a CSF, depending on the years of academic support received. NURSE Corps SP participants may fulfill their service obligation part time by extending the years of service so that the aggregate amount of service performed is the full-time equivalent. In FY 2018, there were 227 NURSE Corps SP graduates from accredited school programs. As of September 30, 2018, 89 were serving in a CSF and 7 in nursing residency programs; 131 were actively seeking employment. Graduates have up to 9 months from the date of graduation to obtain a nursing license, accept an offer of employment from a program-approved facility, and begin full-time or part-time (if approved) clinical services at a CSF. (Appendix A).

Requirement #3: The Amount of Scholarship Payments and Loan Repayments Made

For amounts paid for NURSE Corps LRP and SP new awards and continuations, funded from annual appropriations (base funds) and X-year funds, see Table 3.

Requirement #4: The Educational Institutions Attended by Recipients¹⁵

NURSE Corps SP participants attended 193 schools in 42 states and the District of Columbia. Appendix B illustrates the distribution of FY 2018 new awards by state and educational institution at 126 schools in 38 states.

Requirement #5: The Number and Placement Location of the Scholarship and Loan Repayment Recipients at Healthcare Facilities with a Critical Shortage of Nurses

NURSE Corps LRP and SP participants serve at a CSF. Private entities are not eligible for placement of NURSE Corps LRP participants, unless the entities are non-profit. NURSE Corps SP participants may serve at private, for-profit entities. The CSF definition requires facilities to be in, designated as, or serving a primary care or mental health HPSA. The following types of facilities are eligible CSFs for placement of NURSE Corps LRP and SP participants:

- Critical Access Hospital,
- Disproportionate Share Hospital,
- Public hospital,
- Federally Qualified Health Center,
- Indian Health Service Health Center,
- Native Hawaiian Health Center,
- Rural Health Clinic,
- Skilled Nursing Facility,
- State or Local Public Health or Human Services Department,
- Free and charitable clinic,
- Ambulatory Surgical Center,
- Home Health Agency,

- Hospice program,
- Non-Disproportionate Share Hospital, and
- Nursing home.

In FY 2018, 700 NURSE Corps LRP participants served in 519 CSFs in 46 states and the District of Columbia (Appendix C), and 123 participants served as nurse faculty in 111 schools of nursing in 34 states (Appendix D).

Requirement #6: Default Rate and Actions Required

The NURSE Corps LRP and SP default rates¹⁶ are expressed as the percentage of participants in a cohort (all participants with a new or continuation contract awarded in a FY) who default (number of participants who have defaulted divided by the total number of individuals in the cohort). Individuals often participate for multiple years; however, default rates are calculated in the FY in which an individual received the initial award. Therefore, for any given cohort, the default rate for a FY may change over time. When participants are out of compliance with their service obligation, they are referred to the Division of Participant Support and Compliance for compliance assistance. If the participant does not come into compliance and defaults, the Division of Participant Support and Compliance refers the participant to the Program Support Center for debt collection.

The maximum years a participant in full-time service may be in the NURSE Corps SP is 8 years—4 years in school and 4 years of obligated service. The maximum number of years that a participant may be in the NURSE Corps LRP is 3 years—2 years of service under an initial contract and 1 additional year of service under a continuation. Participants with periods of approved suspension of service may require an additional 1 to 2 years of monitoring. Participants wishing to serve part-time must obtain prior approval from NURSE Corps and must extend the service obligation to equal the full-time commitment. Thus, default rates are reported over 10 years for the NURSE Corps SP and 5 years for the NURSE Corps LRP to provide an accurate picture of default rates. Historically, few to no defaults occur within the first year of the service obligation.

Participants who breach their contracts are placed in default and are liable to repay the NURSE Corps LRP or SP funds they received, plus interest, from the date of the default—the date the participant breached the NURSE Corps contract service obligation. The total amount owed, including interest, must be paid within 3 years of the date of default. The interest rate is the maximum legal prevailing rate for the applicable quarter determined and fixed by the Secretary of the Treasury after taking into consideration private consumer rates of interest. NURSE Corps LRP and SP work with participants placed in default by helping them to satisfy their debts through service when possible. In FY 2018, eight defaulted participants returned to service—1 NURSE Corps LRP participant and seven NURSE Corps SP participants.

Requirement #7: Amount of Outstanding Default Funds of Both the Loan Repayment and Scholarship Programs

Section 846(g)(4) of the PHSA authorizes amounts recovered (X-year funds) from participants who breach their NURSE Corps LRP or SP contract to be made available for the respective program until expended. X-funds are used for new awards, continuations, and modifications to existing contracts. In FY 2018, the NURSE Corps LRP added \$526,814.90 to its X-year account providing 11 new awards, and closed the fiscal year with a net X-year accumulation of \$144,586.63. In FY 2018, the NURSE Corps SP added \$623,301.94 to its X-year account providing 10 new awards and 5 modifications, and closed the fiscal year with a net X-year accumulation of \$247,919.34.

As of September 30, 2018, the total outstanding default debt was \$2,921,885.38 for the NURSE Corps LRP and \$13,371,371.37 for the NURSE Corps SP.

Requirement #8: The Reason for the Default

The most common reasons for default in the NURSE Corps SP are that participants fail to complete their service obligation, fail to verify employment, or receive an academic dismissal.

Requirement #9: The Demographics of the Individuals Participating in the Loan Repayment and Scholarship Programs

NURSE Corps LRP and SP participants self-report demographic data. Of the participants who reported on sex, race, and ethnicity, the majority were female and White, with Black or African-American the largest minority group (Table 8). HRSA requests Hispanic/Latino and Non-Hispanic/Non-Latino ethnicity data in the electronic application separately from gender and race data. Applicants may choose to report on any of these demographic areas in whole or in part. As a result, Hispanic/Latino and Non-Hispanic/Non-Latino data may be over reported as this information is the only metric for capturing ethnicity.

Requirement #10: Justification for the Allocation of Funds between the Loan Repayment and Scholarship Programs

Historically, total NURSE Corps funds have been allocated at 67-75 percent for the LRP and 25-33 percent for the SP. For FY 2018, \$87.1 million was appropriated for the NURSE Corps LRP and SP. Of the \$87.1 million, HRSA allocated \$78.4 million for the NURSE Corps LRP and SP, with the remaining \$8.7 million directly supporting the NURSE Corps programs in the form of staffing and acquisition contracts including the electronic system used to process program applications and monitor awarded participants. Of the \$78.4 million, HRSA allocated over 68 percent (\$53.5 million) to the LRP and over 32 percent (\$24.9 million) to the SP. This

allocation of funding allows the NURSE Corps to expand the pipeline of nurses into the Field Strength by leveraging NURSE Corps SP funding to target nursing professional shortages while also immediately supplying the field with nurses ready to service in underserved communities through NURSE Corps LRP funding. The combination of these programs allows flexibility in meeting the future needs through the NURSE Corps SP pipeline of nurses and the immediate needs through the NURSE Corps LRP, which places nurses in the field immediately.

Requirement #11: An Evaluation of the Overall Costs and Benefits of the Programs

Analysis of Costs per Years of Service

1. FY 2018 NURSE Corps LRP Awards

In FY 2018, HRSA made 544 new awards, an increase of 9 percent compared to the 501 new awards in FY 2017. The average new award amount for NURSE Corps LRP participants was \$81,785.44 for non-faculty and \$80,026.82 for nurse faculty. This is a 7 percent decrease in the average new award amount for non-faculty participants and a 46 percent increase¹⁹ in the average new award amount for nurse faculty participants from FY 2017 to 2018.

NURSE Corps LRP Continuations

In FY 2018, 47 percent of the participants initially awarded in FY 2017 requested a continuation award. The NURSE Corps LRP awarded 279 continuations in FY 2018. Nurse faculty received 25 percent (71 awards) of the continuation awards.

2. FY 2018 NURSE Corps SP Awards

In FY 2018, NURSE Corps SP made 215 new awards. The average new award was \$116,950.86—a 9 percent increase in the number of new awards and a 6 percent increase in the average new award amount from FY 2017 to FY 2018.

3. Average Amount Funded per Year of Service Obligated

NURSE Corps LRP new awards are based on 2 years of obligated service and capped at 60 percent of the applicant's total eligible loan amounts. The average new LRP award amount per year of obligated service was \$40,892.72 for nurses serving in CSFs and \$40,013.41 for nurses serving in accredited schools of nursing—a 7 percent decrease and a 46 percent increase respectively, from FY 2017 to FY 2018.²⁰

NURSE Corps SP awards are based on 1 year of service for each year of funding with a minimum of 2 years of service. The average new SP award amount per year of obligated service was \$52,536.24—a 3 percent increase from FY 2017 to FY 2018.

Highlights

1. Default Rates

While yearly default rates fluctuate as program data are reconciled and each cohort moves closer to expected service completion, the default rates of the programs as of September 30, 2018, are declining. Most notably, the NURSE Corps SP has experienced a decline in defaults every FY since 2012. These rates show that the NURSE Corps LRP and SP are recruiting nurses suited for and with a clear commitment to service in areas with a critical shortage of nurses.

NURSE Corps SP: Of the 2,969 awards made from FY 2008 – FY 2018, 262 participants (9 percent) defaulted as of September 30, 2018. Many defaulting participants did not verify employment, withdrew, or were dismissed from school.

NURSE Corps LRP: Of the 5,721 awards made from FY 2013 – FY 2018, 164 participants (3 percent) defaulted as of September 30, 2018. Most defaulting participants did not complete the service obligation following their resignation from an approved site.

2. NURSE Corps Participants Serving at CSFs and as Nurse Faculty

The overarching goal of the NURSE Corps programs is to ensure that participants are serving where the need is greatest. The NURSE Corps LRP and SP work together to address the need for nurses in CSFs and support nurse faculty at schools of nursing. In FY 2003, the NURSE Corps programs identified health care facilities that HRSA deemed to have a critical shortage of nurses through a new methodology. These facilities or CSFs are health care facilities located in, designated as, or serving a primary care or mental health HPSA. Continued implementation of this redefined method for identifying CSFs resulted in 94 percent of new and continuing awards being made to NURSE Corps RNs serving at CSFs in high-need HPSAs with a score of 14 or higher. The average HPSA score for the FY 2018 CSF placements was about 17.

To increase the number of NPs participating in the programs, the NURSE Corps LRP and SP actively recruits licensed NPs and individuals interested in pursuing training as an NP through outreach efforts to colleges, universities, and associations. In FY 2018, 50 percent of the NURSE Corps LRP and SP funding supported NPs, and the programs made 406 awards to licensed NPs or individuals pursuing training as a NP.

As of September 30, 2018, NURSE Corps had a field strength of 1,865 nurses serving in 1,351 CSFs. Through FY 2018 new and continuation awards, 210 different schools of nursing have NURSE Corps LRP nurse faculty members. The NURSE Corps total field strength includes the FY 2018 new and continuation award participants as well as those participants in ongoing service. As of September 30, 2018, 1,129 NURSE Corps LRP

participants and 465 NURSE Corps SP graduates were in service in CSFs in 50 states, the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands. There were also 271 NURSE Corps LRP nurse faculty participants at accredited professional schools of nursing in 43 states.

In addition, 89.7 percent of NURSE Corps alumni remained at the site where they fulfilled their obligation for up to 2 years beyond completion of their NURSE Corps commitment. Of those who no longer provide care at the site where they fulfilled their obligation, 7.2 percent provide patient care at a different CSF or teach at an accredited school of nursing.²¹

V. Conclusion

The NURSE Corps LRP and SP continue to work towards eliminating areas with a critical shortage of nurses across the United States. Through the efforts and accomplishments highlighted in this report, dedicated RNs and APRNs can care for underserved populations in CSFs and provide quality education in schools of nursing with students from disadvantaged backgrounds.
