


About NCSL

- Voice of the states, D.C. and territories in the federal system











Legislative Priorities for Maternal and Infant Health











Maternal Care Workforce

- Evaluating and providing coverage of doula services
- Requiring or offering bias training for providers

Maternal Mortality

- Increasing access to maternal health care
- Reviewing recommendations from MMRCs

Maternal Mental Health

- Increasing access to mental health screenings
- Implementing teleconsultation for pregnant and postpartum women

Infant Mortality

- Providing educational programs or materials to new parents
- Increasing access to care in rural communities

Newborn Screening

- Funding early childhood screening
- Updating disorders on newborn screening panel



Legislative Examples to Address Maternal and Infant Mortality

Access to Care

- Mississippi (2023)
 extended Medicaid
 coverage to twelve
 months postpartum.
- New York (2021) covers remote patient monitoring for prenatal and postpartum care if recommended by a physician.

Maternal Care Workforce

- <u>Louisiana</u> (2021) required insurers to cover state licensed midwifery care, incl. CNMs and certified professional midwives.
- Delaware (2021) required bias and competency training for healthcare workers and (2022) expanded access to doulas.

Awareness and Education

- Oklahoma (2022) required perinatal providers to provide certain education resources to pregnant individuals.
- <u>Texas</u> (2023) recognizes
 September 23, 2023, as
 Fourth Trimester Care Day.

Review Committees

- North Carolina (2022)
 required their maternal
 mortality review
 committee to include
 community
 representation.
- Florida (2022) required the Department of Health to contract additional fetal and infant mortality review committees in all regions of the state.
