The National Vaccine Program was established in 1986 to achieve optimal prevention of human infectious diseases through immunization and to achieve optimal prevention against adverse reactions to vaccines.





Priorities







Increase vaccine uptake

Focus on increasing vaccination rates, especially among high-risk populations

Improve vaccine education

Provide resources and public messaging to improve vaccine knowledge and address hesitancy

Improve access to vaccines

Reduce disparities and inequities in access to and use of routinely recommended vaccines across the lifespan



Initiatives

Vaccine Innovation

Evaluation of vaccination innovation priorities

Vaccine Safety

Provide direction to improve coordination and stakeholder input into the timely detection of vaccine safety signals

Vaccine Access

Increase access to and use of all routinely recommended vaccines

Vaccine Confidence

Efforts to build public trust in vaccination and address vaccine hesitancy.



Summer of Pride Mpox Equity Pilot


- Improve mpox vaccine equity for populations overrepresented in the outbreak improve mpox vaccine
- Working with community-based organizations, the initiative identifies 25-30 LGBTQI+ events equity for populations overrepresented in the outbreak
- This comprehensive strategy integrates mpox vaccination promotion, awareness, testing, and STOMP study access with additional public health services




