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History of the Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program

- The Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program was named for a courageous young man named Ryan White who was diagnosed with AIDS following a blood transfusion in December 1984. Ryan White was diagnosed at age 13 while living in Kokomo, Indiana
- On August 18, 1990, the Ryan White Comprehensive AIDS Resources Emergency (CARE) Act was passed into law. It was and continues to be the largest federally funded HIV/AIDS-specific program.


Overview: Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program

- Provides comprehensive system of HIV primary medical care, medications, and essential support services for low-income people living with HIV
 - More than half of people living with diagnosed HIV in the United States – over 500,000 people – receive care and support services through the Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program
- Funds grants to states, cities/counties, and local community based organizations
 - \$2.36 billion annual investment (fiscal year 2017)
 - Recipients determine service delivery and funding priorities based on their local needs and planning process

Ryan White HIV/AIDS Grant Program Eligibility Criteria

- **Part A -Cities/Counties**
- **Part B - States and Territories**
 - ADAP – AIDS Drug Assistance Program
- **Part C - Health Care Agencies**
 - Early Intervention Services and Capacity Development
- **Part D - Women, Infants, Children and Youth**
- **Part F - Other programs**
 - AIDS Education and Training Centers (AETCs)
 - Special Projects of National Significance (SPNS)
 - Dental Programs
 - Minority AIDS Initiative (MAI)

Viral Suppression among RWHAP Clients, by State, 2010 and 2016—United States and 2 Territories


